

IN MEMORY

Without our Golden companions, life simply would not be the same. And so we take the opportunity to honor those that have crossed the rainbow bridge. Our Quarter 4 newsletter is dedicated to Nala, Tye and all the other wonderful pups we have lost this season. We thank them for the time they have given us and for enriching our lives.



NALA 16-16

Nala came to GRRIN in June of 2016. She was reported as abandoned, tied to a tree, having an ear infection, a funny walk and she had terribly matted fur. NHS called upon GRRIN to see if we could take her and get to the bottom of her mobility issues as she walked like a high-stepping horse with hyper-extended front legs.

Connie and Gary had just been approved as a foster home. They are retired and were just who Nala needed. There was no hesitation at all by them to take on a Golden with special needs. So Nala went to live with them and their 7 year old Golden, Marley, and their 15 year old disabled Daschund, BooBoo. Nala fit right in. She quickly discovered a love for car rides, chewing on sticks, peanut butter, green beans and all the attention they would lavish.

GRRIN decided to get some testing done about her gait, to see if there was damage to her spine or neck, so arranged a trip to the Kansas State Veterinary School. Needing more time than could be provided at that time, it was settled to only do a neurological exam and xrays of the neck to see if there was anything glaringly abnormal. Neither provided true insight on the issue.

Returning to Omaha with little data was a disappointment, so another appointment was scheduled at lowa State Veterinary School. Nala was to see a Neurologist, but he had left the day before arriving. So she saw an Orthopedic specialist, who then proceeded to do the wrong scan on Nala. Nala had been through enough. So she came home.

At Gold Rush in 2016, Nala met Dr. Eckermann from 5 Elements who felt she could help Nala. Nala faithfully went to therapy, swimming and manipulations to improve her gait and improve her range of motion. Gary and Connie took her to every appointment and stayed by her side, encouraging her, and loving her more.

Nala started gaining weight through the year, and various means were tried to get it under control through thyroid and then pituitary medicines, unsuccessfully. In June, 2017, Nala started her decline. She could not keep her food down, was panting more and began getting very weak. She was taken to the Urgent Care Hospital one weekend because her symptoms had escalated. She was on several anti-nausea meds, none of which were working. On Monday, she returned to Dr. Bashara, her regular vet, and the news was not good. But Nala was ready. She was exhausted. So Gary and Connie took her home for one last day. They all returned to the vet's later that afternoon, and surrounded by many friends, Nala crossed the Rainbow Bridge.

Nala came into our hearts and remains there. We know she is watching over us, Gary and Connie and all her friends she made the last year of her life. She was a special girl. Rest in Peace, Nala.





TYE 07-42

Tye came to GRRIN in September of 2007. Sadly, he had been abused, had his vocal chords clipped and was malnourished by his previous owner. He found his forever home with Amy Harvey and family.

The Harvey's were in love from the start and watched Tye blossom under their care. He was a loving, sweet, silly addition to the family and such a joy to them and his fur-brother, Tucker. He loved to play ball and give kisses and loved by everyone he met. He was so docile, never growled or snapped, and it left the Harvey family wondering how someone could have treated him so terribly.

Sadly, Tye went blind in September of this year. Tucker would assist him as he could, as if he knew and was protecting him. Amy treated his eyes diligently with 3 types of drops, 3 times a day to help with the glaucoma and hyphema that had set in. His eye pressure returned to normal in both eyes, he remained blind but appeared to have no other health issues.

Then in mid-October Tye began to have cluster seizures, experiencing over 20 in less than 10 hours. His health was failing and brokenheartedly the Harvey's knew that he was suffering. Tye crossed the Rainbow Bridge in October. His family misses him dearly and he will forever hold a place in their hearts.

Rest in peace Tye, and thank you for all of the joy and love you brought to the world.





FIVE REASONS TO ADOPT A SENIOR PET

Sure, puppies and kittens are cute. But they're also a lot of work. There's the housetraining, the biting, the scratching and the jumping – just to name a few "endearing" traits that will need to be addressed. On the other hand, if you adopt a senior pet, you may not have to worry about most of that. Instead, you'll likely gain a calmer, gentler, and extremely loyal friend. Here is what else you can expect:

3 01.

A senior dog has probably already been trained. Basic "sit," "stay," and "come" commands might be obeyed without coaxing or easily relearned with some positive reinforcement and treats. Teaching your senior dog (or cat!) new tricks can also be easier than training a younger animal and is a great way to help keep your pet's brain sharp...In addition, it's a good bet that an older pet has been housetrained.



02. 📽

Most senior pets like to take it easy. Just like people, dogs and cats tend to mellow out in their older years. They're usually less rambunctious than puppies or kittens and are also less likely to ingest foreign objects or destroy things around the house. The right older pet might make a perfect couch companion. Just don't forget that they, too, need regular exercise to help maintain a healthy weight and help build and maintain muscle condition. Check with your veterinarian before creating or changing your pet's exercise routine.



What you see is typically what you get. In other words, when you meet your potential pet, you have the benefit of knowing what you're getting in terms of size and in some cases, personality. That said, a senior pet may not be a good fit for homes with small children or other pets, especially if the dog or cat has previously enjoyed life as an only child.

Older pets can bond with you. You don't have to share your life with a dog or cat from puppyhood or kittenhood to become the best of friends. It may take time for your pet to settle into her new space – especially if she's spent a significant amount of time at a shelter. But if an older pet starts to require more care, she will likely appreciate your extra love and be extra gracious in return.

You could help reduce the number of pets in animal shelters. The ASPCA estimates that 1.5 million shelter animals are euthanized each year. And because they're not usually considered to be as cute or cuddly as puppies or kittens, senior pets have a higher chance of being part of that number.

As soon as you adopt your senior dog or cat, visit your veterinarian to make sure there are no underlying health conditions that need to be addressed. Your vet can also help you establish a good wellness plan to ensure that your "new" pet will stay happier and healthier throughout her golden years.
