#### STRIKING GOLD.

Greetings GRRIN Readers! Valentine, York, Aurora, Sydney, and Madison here! Four months ago we were Goldens living on the streets of Turkey. Now we are here in Nebraska living new lives, with loving families.

Our journey started when we flew from Turkey and landed in Chicago on May 20th. After this long flight we were met in Chicago by GRRIN volunteers who cleaned us, fed and watered us, and then gave us some hugs and belly rubs (this was the best part of all). The next day, after a long drive, we arrived in Omaha to many open arms, and the GRRIN foster families who welcomed us into their homes.

The next weeks and months were a learning process for everyone. We had to learn about living in a home, (couches and beds are particularly nice) and that we could relax because we had humans who would take care of us. On top of the usual challenges faced by foster families, OUR foster families had to learn about caring for dogs who had been fending for themselves and roaming freely, particularly York, a.k.a "Don't-fenceme-in". In the end, GRRIN volunteers being GRRIN volunteers, and Goldens

being Goldens, we all figured it out.

Through the same system that GRRIN has used for 25 years now (loving foster families and hard work by all of the Rescue Team members) GRRIN has been able to find loving, caring homes for all of us from Turkey (we don't like being referred to as Turkey dogs).

We are Goldens to whom the word "rescue" truly applies. Thank you to the entire GRRIN family for helping to give us a life that we could only imagine. We truly believe we have struck gold!

Special note: As we worked on this update about our rescue dogs from Turkey, one of the five, Madison, was diagnosed with latestage Leukemia. We still can't believe it, but she crossed the Rainbow Bridge within a few weeks. She was in the loving arms of her foster mom and caseworker, who worked tirelessly to make her comfortable in her last days. We've decided to keep the update as originally written. #### GOLDEN EYES + FALLEN APPLES

Chloe (08-38) was Tammy Weihe and her family's first foster dog. They found each other during the summer of 2008, when Chloe was nearly 5 years old. Over the years Chloe has come to enjoy the Weihe family's special traditions during apple season; searching out fallen apples from their trees, and even jumping up on her hind legs to pick her own apples.

Chloe was originally surrendered due to severe hip dysplasia and further evaluation through her veterinary specialist suggested hip replacement would be in her future. Various other treatments were explored and eight years later, Chloe still has her original

hips. In fact, what ails Chloe now at age 13 is as far from her hips as can be, and something no one could predict.

Earlier this year, Tammy noticed that Chloe's eyes were becoming increasingly cloudy. In April she was taken to an eye specialist and diagnosed with anterior uveitis, an eye disease that is unique to Golden Retrievers. Anterior uveitis is an inflammation of the middle layer of the eye, which includes the iris (colored part of the eye) and the adjacent tissue. If untreated, it can cause permanent damage and loss of vision from the development of glaucoma, cataract or retinal edema.

Chloe's initial vet visit revealed immense pressure from glaucoma and loss of sight in her right eye while her left eye remained at normal pressure levels. She began treatment for the glaucoma in her right eye at that time. A follow-up visit confirmed the pressure in Chloe's left eye had skyrocketed, leaving her blind in that eye as well.

Tammy began to notice a change in Chloe's behavior. She slept more, but woke frequently; she was less social and not as interested in what was happening in the house, even in the kitchen. This shift, along with the vet's concern that the glaucoma was causing pain levels similar to a migraine headache, caused the Weihe

family to take action. They made the decision to have Chloe's eyes removed and she had the surgery in mid-July of this year.

Throughout this experience Chloe has remained a calm, patient teacher. More heartwarming yet is the patience and care Chloe's Golden companion, Bright, has shown her since the surgery. Where two-year-old Bright would have once been quick to grab any food he could steal, he now sits, without direction, and waits for Chloe to find her food. What proof that Goldens really are the best companions!

Tammy shares her personal story in an effort to raise awareness of this disease unique to Goldens. She wants to encourage you all to seek veterinary care if you see changes in the appearance of your Golden's eyes. This is a condition that can cause considerable pain and affect your dog's behavior and quality of life.

Today Chloe is a happy girl once again. Her quality of life has drastically improved since the elimination of her eye pain. She is adapting to being blind and ventures out further to explore the yard as each day passes. You'll see Chloe this fall greeting the neighbors, wagging her tail and, of course... searching for fallen apples. Tammy is happy to report she still has no problem finding them!
