INTERVIEW WITH A FOSTER FAMILY

If you've ever thought about becoming a foster family but weren't sure about what it might entail, this interview may help to give you some perspective. We asked Patty and John, long-time foster parents, a few questions about what drew them to fostering and why they continue to foster.

Q. How long have you been a foster home and how many dogs have you fostered?

A. We have been fostering dogs for about 12-13 years intermittently, and there have been about 14-15 different dogs in our home. When our resident dogs were older and more fragile, we would take a break from fostering to respect the needs of our senior pets.

Q. Why did you decide to become a foster home and why do you continue to foster?

A. We have enjoyed the company of dogs for many years, so fostering seemed like a good way to volunteer when it worked for our household. We have met wonderful people through GRRIN who were caseworkers and adoptive families. It is a treat to be part of the "happy ending" when a dog is matched with the right family to meet his or her needs.

Q. What is the best part of fostering? What is the worst/hardest part of fostering?

A. The best part of fostering is learning the personality and strengths of each dog and what family environment would work best for each of them. The hardest part is to see the dogs who are stressed or traumatized from the transitions or from their past experiences. It may not be the fault of their prior owners...just difficult situations. We get attached to our foster dogs, and it can be a little sad to see them leave our home. But there is also joy. We know we could have been a "good enough" family for a lot of the dogs temporarily in our care, but our home wasn't the "best" home for them. Some of the dogs would thrive better as the only dog in a home, to have a person around most of the day, or need a different energy/activity level than what we might offer. Finding that right match is always the goal. We appreciate that GRRIN team members work closely with the foster homes to help identify the best matches for the dogs from the families waiting to adopt.

Q. Is there a story you'd like to share about fostering for GRRIN?

A. We have a lot of fun memories of our foster dogs. There were lots of cuddles and snuggles, games of fetch and neighborhood walks. We learned (the hard way) to keep food away from the edge of the counter; a very nice salmon filet disappeared one evening. Another dog decided he should eat ALL the cubed bread from a bowl set aside for the Thanksgiving stuffing. That prompted a quick trip to the grocery store! On an early morning walk with our own 2 resident dogs and the foster dog, our guest dog wanted to stop and sniff a bit. We give him credit for saving us all from a skunk encounter if we had continued on at our regular pace. He got an extra treat when we got home!!

Q. What advice do you have for someone who is thinking about becoming a foster home?

A. There are important things to consider for a successful family fostering experience: Identify what types of dogs you could foster well. Some foster families are good with helping dogs learn structure and better manners, and others are great with diets and medical needs. Some very active dogs or ones who have been breeder dogs may not do well in a kennel for 8-9 hours during a work day...they need someone with more hours at home. Consider the status of your family and your resident pets and what "ages and stages" of dogs would they accept and tolerate. Safety of small children is critical, and it wouldn't be fair to the children or an overly active or stressed foster dog to have an injury. We have fostered different types of dogs over the years in response to changes in our household. The Foster Care Coordinators are very experienced and can be helpful to answer questions for anyone interested in fostering for GRRIN. We have enjoyed the fostering experience immensely with GRRIN, and we hope others will consider trying it too!
