ANNUAL MEETING

Every April, GRRIN members gather at the annual meeting to vote for board members, learn about the financial health of the organization, hear about how rescue operations went during the previous year, and, most importantly, socialize and eat! This year's meeting was held on Sunday, April 23rd from 12pm-2pm and was once again held in the Nebraska Humane Society Auditorium. We had the largest attendance in recent history - 51 people and 16 dogs!

GRRIN President Barbara Garrett opened the meeting with a few words of welcome and then invited everyone to start lunch. The food was catered by Mangia Italiana. On offer was lasagna, tortellini alfredo, salad, rolls, cookies, and a cake thanking GRRIN volunteers. While people ate and chatted, the votes from the board election were tallied. All board members on the ballot were reelected and will serve additional two-year terms.

After lunch, Resource Chair Warren Narducci introduced Marley, whose medical journey was featured in GRRIN's last newsletter. He talked about how Marley is a great example of the expensive medical care that GRRIN is called on to provide to foster dogs in its care. After Warren, Treasurer Chris Fletcher informed everyone that GRRIN is a financially healthy organization. Then, Rescue Chair Judy Davis shared the 2022 end-of-year rescue report and communicated that 2023 so far has been a busy year. Barb then returned to the podium to thank all of the people who foster and adopt. Without foster homes and adoptive families, GRRIN wouldn't be able to fulfill its mission of rescuing golden retrievers.

After the board reports, Barb invited up Dr. Cris Macke from the Macke Institute of Canine Therapy. Dr. Macke is a physical therapist for both dogs and people. Her presentation was entitled "The Golden Age: Senior Support" and focused on how to care for senior dogs to help them live happy, pain-free lives. In her presentation, Dr. Macke shared her seven steps to senior success. These included environmental modifications, activity modifications, therapeutic exercises, adaptive devices, massage, supplements, and medication. Dr. Macke's presentation gave examples for each of these steps and how they can be used to help improve the lives of our dogs. She finished out her presentation with a few minutes of Q&A.

Thank you to everyone who attended the meeting. Members and volunteers are how we accomplish our work and we couldn't do it without you.

We have had some great travel experiences with our golden retriever, Shadow, over the past few years. She enjoys rides in the car, wants to please, and likes to share new experiences with her humans. We are lucky she has trained US well. Here are some ideas if you are considering including your dog on vacation:

PRACTICE

Before heading out on a multi-day road trip, we took Shadow to some NE State Park cabins for overnight stays. She learned "the pack" could stay together in other places, and it was fun. We made sure she had her usual bed pads, a couple of favorite toys, water/food bowls, and treats. We stopped every couple of hours on the journey for water and potty breaks and learned to carry extra water in the car for unexpected hikes or a spill.

If you are going to visit a city, you might want to do more walking in downtown urban areas for the new smells, noises, and car/people traffic exposure.

SAFETY

Shadow wears a halter where the front chest ring hooks into a seat belt tether while in the car. That lets her sit up, lay down, and look out the window from the back seat. It also doesn't let her become a 70-pound flying object in an accident! Her short and long leashes were in a back seat pocket for easy retrieval at rest stops.

She loves her kennel at home and sees it as a safe space. The wire crate is too bulky to pack, so we found an easy-fold, soft-sided option with a zipper mesh top that is tall enough for a golden retriever and about 5 ft. wide. A very anxious dog could chew through it. Shadow sleeps in it contentedly at the vacation home and stays there if we go somewhere she isn't allowed (museum, aquarium, restaurant).

We take a plastic bag with Shadow's vaccination information, vet contact, and her monthly flea/tick and heartworm meds. Some people stop those medications during the NE winter months, but your dog may need them in the southern or warmer states.

Learn about your location and what could be dangerous. We don't think about poisonous snakes, scorpions, riptides, cactus, alligators in a lake, or backcountry predators in eastern Nebraska. Talk to the local people and do your research before hiking or swimming.

LODGING

We have found excellent lodging for our vacation destinations through Airbnb and VRBO that included dog-friendly houses with fenced yards. (If you can, plan ahead to get the best selection of choices.)

On the road we used our phones to find "dog-friendly motels." We also used the BringFido.com website to review motels (and restaurants) that are listed as dog-friendly. Several motel chains advertise as pet-friendly, but check the pet size restrictions or fees they may charge. A "good deal" disappears with a large and non-refundable pet deposit. We found the quality of rooms varied. Some rooms were well-maintained, and others had a minimum-security prison décor. As it was only one night, we didn't worry as long as it was clean.





Our travel motel criteria included a first floor location with an outside room entrance, nonsmoking, king-sized bed, and near some green space for a quick stroll late at night or early in the morning. An end unit would be great if your dog likes to bark.

For our "one night, just sleep there" motels we didn't want to unpack the whole car. We had a small travel bag for the human needs and a bag for Shadow with her premeasured and bagged food, treats, toys, any meds, and a king-sized bed sheet. The first person in the room spread the sheet over the people bed. (Shadow is allowed on our bed at home and we didn't want to risk muddy paws on the motel covers/linens.) We also didn't want to unpack the crate, so she slept on a corner of the king-sized bed so EVERYONE had space for a good night's sleep.

RESTAURANTS/MEALS

When traveling we had an accessible, small cooler for drinks, fruit and cheese. We could snack at a rest area or get some food "to go" and eat in a community park. That allowed for a mid-day walk. Eight or nine hours was long enough for us to be in the car. We tried to stop before dark so one person could take Shadow on a long walk and the other person unpacked the car, set up the room and checked on dinner options. We often brought restaurant take-out back to the room to keep it simple during winter travel.

BringFido.com helped us find dog-friendly restaurants to enjoy a more leisurely meal. Several brew-pubs advertised their dog-friendly environments. Most places offered patio-seating as their dog-friendly option. Shadow sat under our table on a pier while we watched surfers in the Atlantic and enjoyed some great seafood. The waiter included a bowl of water for her when setting up our table.

OTHER TRICKS

- Bring some dog towels from home to use. Lots of communities have do-it-yourself dog wash businesses, but it's nice to have what you need for a simple "muddy paw" clean-up without destroying your host's towels.
- Make sure your cell phone number is on the collar or harness.
- A bag of small, low calorie treats kept in the car helps focus good behavior. We used them at restaurants to reward good behavior and at other venues to keep her on task.
- A jacket with zipper pockets for your phone, billfold, car keys and poop bags is enough for walks and easy errands/adventures. Put the purse away.
- We didn't leave Shadow alone at the house for the first week of our stay. After one week, a routine was established and she was more comfortable with the environment. A Kong with some peanut butter and treats also convinced her we could leave for a couple of hours. (Just like home!)
- When traveling, Shadow had a nice walk in the morning before a long day on the road to settle her down and clean out her digestive system. That also allowed the other person to start packing up the car.
- We kept rolls of poop bags in all the car door pockets so they were accessible. We also traveled with multiple, refillable water bottles and a collapsible water bowl.
